Dear Chairman Cole and Ranking Member McGovern:

As you consider amendments to H.R. 5893, the Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2024, we write to urge you to consider that Amendment #124 be made in order.

This amendment would strike Section 219 of the above-named bill, which requires the Attorney General to issue an Environmental Impact Statement, Record of Decision, and all studies, statements, and other authorizations for the construction, operation, and maintenance of the proposed Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) facilities in Letcher County, KY, and states these actions shall not be subject to judicial review. Section 219 also exempts the Federal Bureau of Prisons from judicial review for operational matters, which may prohibit incarcerated people from seeking judicial remedies for civil and statutory civil rights violations that occur at this facility.

For several reasons, over 200 organizations from around the country have already signed on in opposition to Section 219. Their concerns are all addressed by Amendment #124.

Section 219 directs a final decision on the construction of Federal Correctional Institution (FCI) Letcher to be made within 30 days, effectively terminating the federally mandated environmental review process, pre-empting the required public comment periods and barring public input on the project. These processes provide essential checks on the prison's potential environmental impacts on endangered bat habitat, wetlands, and old-growth forest, as well as public health consequences of arsenic and radon exposure for incarcerated people, correctional staff, and families visiting their loved ones.

More specifically, in bypassing an updated environmental review, Section 219 would require the Bureau of Prisons to rely on an environmental study that is over six years old. The 2017 site study does not reflect scientific advancements in the understanding of climate change and environmental injustice. It also fails to account for extreme weather events like the devastating flood in Letcher County last year, which washed out roads and submerged the small bridge in Roxana, Kentucky where the prison is slated to be built. According to the *Wall Street Journal*, Letcher County has "the largest hidden flood risk in the U.S."

Furthermore, Section 219 attempts to strip federal courts of jurisdiction to hear legal challenges to the prison's construction or operation, including challenges brought under the essential environmental protection laws that, until recently, applied to every other federal construction

project in the country. Echoing the recent move to exempt the Mountain Valley Pipeline from judicial review, Section 219 creates a dangerous precedent for future carve-outs to exempt federal projects from environmental protection laws.

Section 219's bar on litigation responsive to the operation of FCI Letcher may also deprive incarcerated people of their constitutional and statutory rights. If Section 219 becomes law, incarcerated people would potentially have no redress for unlawful conditions of confinement, deprivations of medical care, First Amendment infringements, violations of the Rehabilitation Act, and more. Section 219 could leave people incarcerated at FCI Letcher – already isolated hundreds of miles from their families – uniquely vulnerable to maltreatment and abuse.

All communities that stand to be impacted by the construction of FCI Letcher should have the ability to exercise their right to comment on the proposed prison, but Section 219 forecloses those rights in accelerating the prison's construction. Letcher County community members and other stakeholders from across the country should have a say when it comes to such a significant change in the community, particularly given the price tag of over \$500 million taxpayer dollars and the false promises of prison-based economic development. Since the federal incarceration rate has dramatically decreased over the last decade, the Trump and Biden Administrations and the BOP have consistently asked the funding previously allocated to this project be rescinded. This amendment fast-tracks a project that much evidence points to as being a mismanagement of funds.

In addition to disregarding the voice of the local community, the construction of the prison has consequences that reach far beyond Letcher County. FCI Letcher would fall within the Bureau of Prison's Mid-Atlantic Region, housing individuals from within a 500 mile radius and leaving many incarcerated people disconnected from their local support systems.

If Section 219 were presented as an amendment, parliamentarian advice would counsel against this attempt to legislate in an appropriations bill. Amendment #124 corrects this deviation from the procedural norm and would preserve public input, environmental review, and judicial rights as required by relevant laws.

We request your Committee's favorable view of Amendment #124, which would strike Section 219, and we further urge that the amendment be made in order. Thank you again for the opportunity to submit comments and for your consideration.
